There were over 250 people at the St. Boniface Cathedral who came to celebrate the *Feast for Consecrated Life* on Friday, February 2, 2018. Those gathered came to give

thanks and pray with the numerous religious men and women who have helped make our church, and our society, what it is today.

The Archdiocese of St. Boniface commemorated this Feast to remember and honour the religious priests, brothers and sisters who have and are serving our diocese over the past 200 years.



Holy Mass began with the aboriginal Woman's Honour Song, a fitting way to acknowledge that it was our aboriginal brothers and sisters who inhabited this land,



before the missionaries arrived. They, along with the volunteer Diocesan Choir, the choir from St. Philip Minh parish, and the Sisters of the Handmaid of the Child Jesus led us in music and song throughout Mass.

Our praise and celebration flowed easily and comfortably with Sr. Jeannine Vermette, SNJM coordinating the evening.

The homily was a particularly moving time during which we were shown the magnitude of the presence that our religious congregations have been to us. Each of the serving religious congregations selected one person to speak on their behalf. The appointed person spoke the name of their congregation and its particular

There were sixteen religious congregations present which helped this part of the celebration become a deep time to reflect and once again to give thanks for each religious' sacrificial, generous service and dedication to our Lord Jesus Christ and His Church.
