This year's St. Malo Winter Camps ran for five weekends, in January and February, from Friday evening until Sunday afternoon. "At camp, we strive to be authentic disciples of Jesus Christ in a fun, nurturing and lifegiving environment" (Mission Statement). With this goal in mind, the leaders of the camps realize the utmost importance of forming young people in their faith.

Each winter since 1994, the St. Malo Catholic School of Evangelization (CSE) has held youth camps. They are offered either in French, in English or bilingual. Since the founding of this ministry, thousands of children

have come through CSE's doors to attend the camp.

The camp offers several activities, including outside games, crafts, music, talks, Mass and reconciliation. The campers are encouraged to share and express their own creativity, talents and gifts. They come to be rejuvenated in their Catholic faith, to make healthy relationships and to have fun in a safe environment.

A 12-year old camper states: "Being able to go was a great experience. I continue to share the love Jesus taught us and learn more about my faith. I had a wonderful time and really look

forward to future camps".

#### Archbishop's Message

#### Together in Jesus Christ

Dear friends,

From all times, people have gathered to express and celebrate what unites them. Think of a Winnipeg Jets game or a rock star concert or a July 1<sup>st</sup> gathering at The Forks. Why should it be any different with the Church, with the People of God, united in Christ and in their common life in Him?

One of the five guiding principles of the Plan of Action for *The Spiritual and Pastoral Renewal for the Archdiocese of Saint Boniface* is to enhance our Catholic identity, to grow in our sense of communion with Christ and with one another. An excellent way to do this would be to have diocesan gatherings for both educational and celebratory reasons.

In the coming months, two such events are being planned in our Archdiocese: 1) An annual (hopefully!) diocesan gathering on May 31<sup>st</sup> and June 1<sup>st</sup>. This year, the special guest speaker will be Fr. Thomas Rosica, Founder/Director of *Salt + Light Television*. 2) An annual (again hopefully!) Archdiocesan Gala Evening on June 13<sup>th</sup>.

The first event is one for the whole

family. There will be opportunities to pray, to learn and to have fun – something for everyone. Come one, come all!

The Gala Evening on June 13<sup>th</sup> is an evening of fine dining, entertainment and dancing. This gala will be the first of what will become an annual event, with proceeds going to a diocesan initiative. This year's beneficiary is our Cathedral as we proceed with Phase Two of the 6 million dollar restoration and renovation project.

The First Phase, already completed and paid for, was for a 3 million dollar replacement of the roof cover and repairs to the foundations for water drainage, as well as repairs to the windows including the major upper stained glass window of the Risen Christ.

Phase Two will firstly see to the renovations of the downstairs hall, kitchen, meeting rooms and bathrooms, to better serve all gatherings, especially diocesan and parish events. Secondly, Phase Two will see to important renovations of the worship

space as well as ancillary spaces in the upper level that might



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be used to further develop our welcome of visitors and tourists.

The Archdiocesan Gala Evening provides an opportunity for people throughout the diocese to participate in supporting this restoration and renewal project of the Cathedral - our Mother Church. I invite parishes and individuals from across our whole archdiocese to consider supporting this project by attending the Gala; it will also be a fun occasion to gather and affirm our unity.

So please mark your calendars for both the May 31<sup>st</sup> and June 1<sup>st</sup> **Diocesan Gathering** and for the June 13<sup>th</sup> **Gala**. Further details will be forthcoming. I invite you to plan to be part of either or both of these events as we continue to build up the life of our diocese and parishes as a communion of faith and charity.

# A Return To The Spirit of Who We Are

"Our message is that God was making all mankind his friends through Christ. God did not keep an account of their sins, and he has given us the message which tells how he makes them his friends." 2 Cor 5:19

Returning to Spirit (RTS) is a non-profit organization, created by an Aboriginal man and a Sister who wanted to reconcile the first Nations and the Church faced with the heritage of residential schools. To achieve this, the process is lived in two steps: the 'return to the Spirit' and the reconciliation.

In February 2012, the reconciliaCTION group from Université de Saint-Boniface, lead by Sr. Norma McDonald, hosted the first step of *Returning to Spirit*. The fiveday workshop transformed our lives! It was a spiritual deepening: a return to the spirit of who we are. We also learned, through a healthy process of communication, to reconcile with others. The ultimate goal was to live a reconciliation process with residents of residential schools and their descendants who suffered the repercussions.

On February 18 to 22, 2013, the reconcili-**ACTION** group of Saint Boniface Archdiocese, with laity, a deacon, four priests and Archbishop James Weisgerber of the Winnipeg Archdiocese, as well as members of Hollow Water First Nations, participated in a reconciliation workshop held at St-Paul's College, University of Manitoba. This second step of the process of RTS helped us to enter in a profound reconciliation with others. This journey was such an unforgettable experience that it must be shared with all!
